Since the approval of our original variance in the spring of 2014, Billings Public School central office and site level teams have been working to train administrative staff and site level staff in the standards and indicators of the AdvancED accreditation process. Each school has been developing and collecting the different artifacts that will be necessary for the review that will take place in 2016-2017 in all three of our comprehensive high schools and in 2017 at our Career Center.

In the fall of 2013 we invited AdvancED personnel to our District to detail the components of the AdvancED Accreditation Process. At that in-service our high school principals were very interested in exploring the AdvancED Accreditation Process and felt that it was a more robust and comprehensive school improvement process than the previous Northwest Accreditation Process. In the summer of 2014 our high school administrative staff had an in-service training opportunity to





detail the components of the AdvancED review. Another in-service was held the following year. Team leaders, as well as an administrator from each of our high schools, attended the AdvancED conference in Bozeman the past two years. They, in turn, were prepared to take information back to their staff for the "buy in" and training that would be necessary for implementation of this school improvement process. It is critical to BPS that the AdvancED process be a meaningful school improvement process with high staff commitment and investment. We have had many school improvement initiatives and have learned that training and "buy in" are critical components for a meaningful, sustainable process. Many such initiatives have failed because we as a district have failed to "go slow, so we could go fast later."

A critical part of this preparation process has been the participation of a team from each school, led by a site level administrator as well as a district level administrator, participating as a member of an AdvancED review team for other AA schools in Montana. Billings sent review team members to Glacier High School, Kalispell High School and Helena High School during the 2015-2016 school year. Additionally, Brenda Koch, executive director for BPS, has led an AdvancED review for Helena High School. Administrative staff in Billings--central office and site level--have participated in AdvancED reviews for similar size districts across the country, as well as small districts in various parts of the country, with the intent to make the process a valuable, sustainable and comprehensive process for Billings Public Schools and to gain the expertise and knowledge to help their schools through this process.

Our three high schools, through their faculty councils, school improvement committees, PLC groups, department heads, and administrative teams have completed initial AdvancED self assessments of their schools. These initial self assessments were for the purpose of helping the staff understand the categories they will be reviewed in--Purpose and Direction, Governance and Leadership, Teaching and Assessing for Learning, Resources and Support Systems, Using Results for Continuous Improvements--with various indicators for each standard and rubric for scoring each indicator. These teams consist of administrators, teachers, support staff, Parent Advisory Councils and students. Students have been included in the process and the administrative teams at the high schools have been educating their students on the AdvancED process-- getting their feedback as to the shared values and beliefs of the student body as they prepare for the review year (2016-2017).



In the next couple of months the AdvancEd staff survey--certified and support (approximately 250 per school), student survey (approximately 5,450), and parent survey(approximately 5450) will be sent out from our high schools to the various groups. All parents, all staff (certified and support) and all students will be asked to complete a survey. This data will be used extensively in the review of our high schools.

There are five administrators at West and Senior and four at Skyview. They are all involved in the process. At least one administrator from each school has attended the State Conference for AdvancEd in Bozeman for two-five years. District level training has been provided two different times for our administrative staff in the spring of 2014 and the spring of 2015. As stated a team from each high school has participated in either the AdvancED Kalispell High School, Glacier High School or Helena High School review.

**3. Provide evidence local school stakeholders were involved in the consideration and development of the proposed renewal variance application. School stakeholder groups include trustees, administrators, teachers and classified school staff.**

The Board of Trustees approved the AdvancEd renewal at their March 2016 meeting. Site level administrators and staff are currently working on the process at their individual sites in preparation for the 2016-2017 reviews. They have participated in site reviews as members of the review team and are working in teams at their schools gathering various artifacts for the standards and indicators that will be reviewed next year. The Trustees have been involved in this process in the sense that we have shared at one of their committee meetings what AdvancED is and how it replaces the Northwest Accreditation Process. They have also approved the variance two times -- once in the spring of 2014 and March of 2016. That document was attached to the original document sent to the Board of Public Education.

Goal 1: To use the ELIOT Observation Took to improve teaching and learning at each site.



Our administrative staff as well as our teaching staff have had a limited amount of training on the use of the ELIOT at this point in time. Contractual requirements give us somewhat limited leeway on this tool. Some administrators have, with permission of staff, have used the tool as an observation piece and find it very valuable. It will be used, with approval of our union leadership, during the review process next year.

Goal 2: This goal was to identify goals based on data provided by the review in each of the AdvancED standards.

This has yet to take place as we have not yet had our review. Goal setting for each standard will occur after the review and the goals will be based on the recommendations from the AdvancED review team as well as information we receive from surveys, observations and assessments. Staff at each site has been involved in reviewing the indicators for the standards and collecting the artifacts necessary for the review.

Goal 3: To use the AdvancED data to guide our schools in the development and use of formative assessments.

Our high schools, through their PLC process are in various stages of the development of formative assessments. It is department-by-department and school-by-school right now as to the completion of this task. During the 2016-2017 term it is our goal to allocate time and resources to start working with the different curricular departments from each of our schools to bring together what they have currently developed and come to a consensus on formative assessments for the district by department and content areas. It is important that we have a guaranteed viable curriculum for all students regardless of what high school they attend.

Goal 4: To use the AdvancED data as a piece of the overall data we have on students to make programming and instructional decisions.

We don't, as yet, have the AdvancED data. After our reviews, the information provided for us from the reviews, will be an integral part of our high school district site school improvement process.

Goal 5: To use the AdvancED review to help us monitor our progress toward meeting the Montana Content Standards.

We don't have AdvancED review data, but as requested, attached to this document you will find the Billings Public School Strategic Plan for the next five years with targets. Also attached is data from each of our three high schools for the last two-three years in the following areas: attendance, math, reading, graduation rates, dropout. This information will be reported using the NWEA, district data collection and state data collection resources.

Data for the following items is attached: attendance, dropout, graduation rates, NWEA math and reading data, ACT and Smarter Balanced. 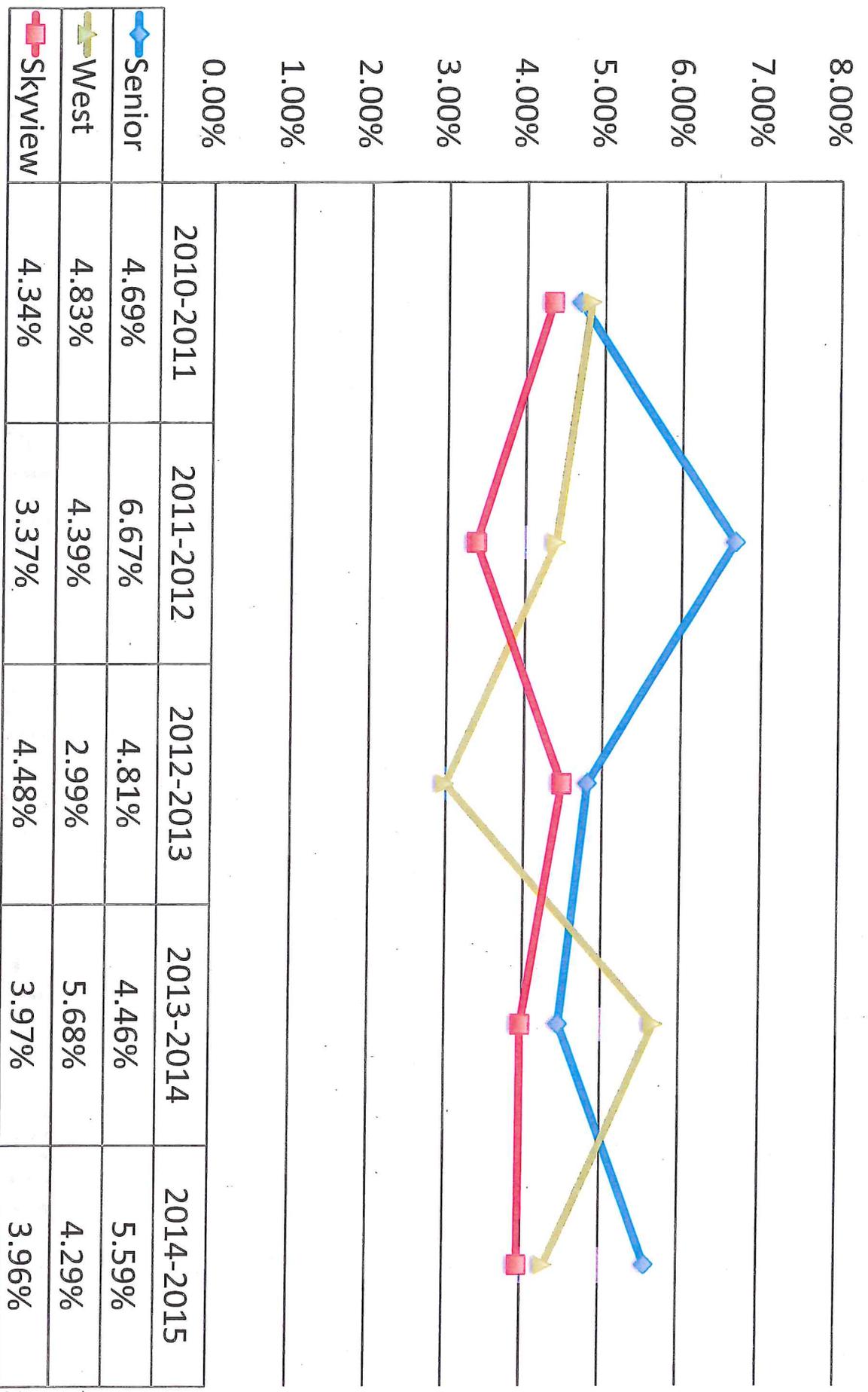

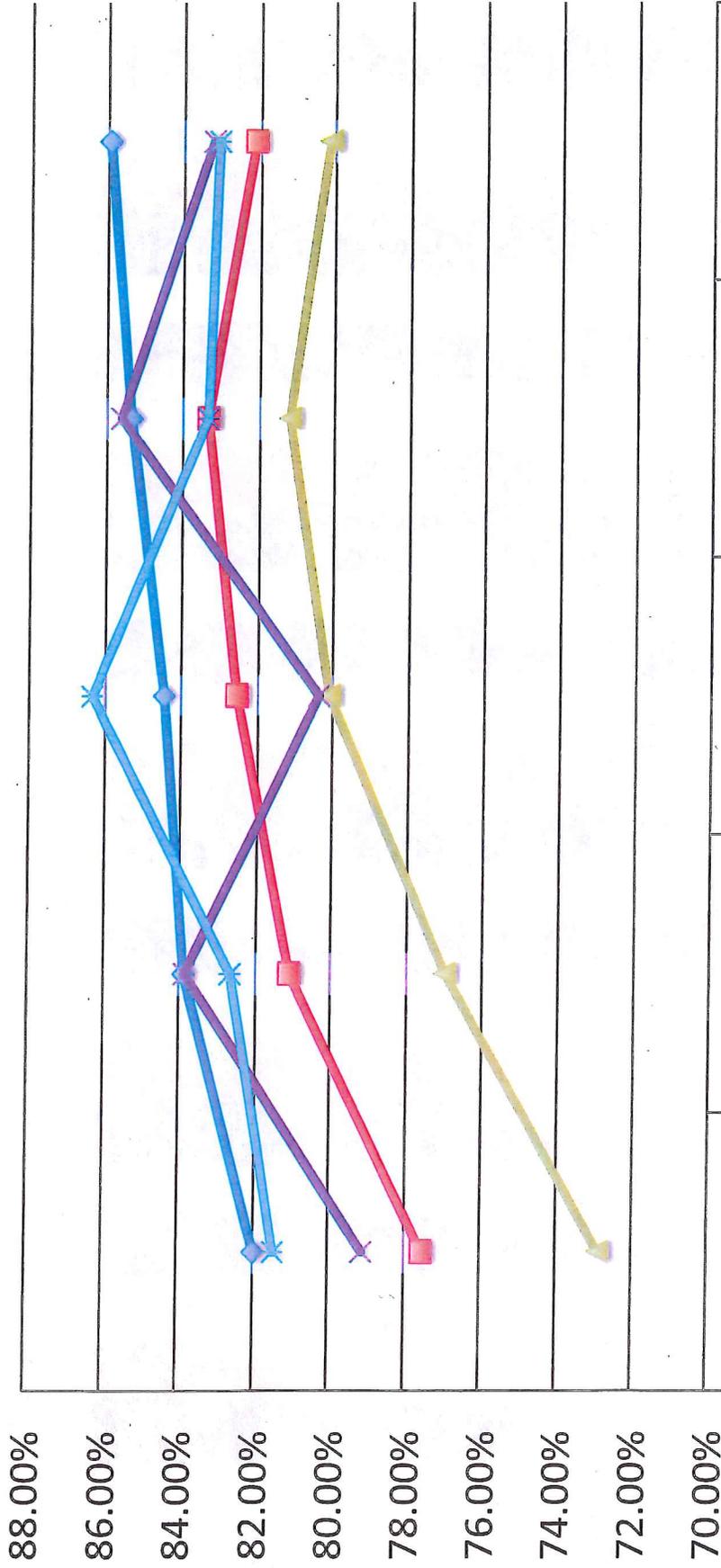
**Goal:** Billings Skyview will increase graduation rates for the 2015-2016 school term from 83.20% to 84%.

### **INTERVENTIONS FOR INCREASED GRADUATION RATES:**

1. Each administrator at West, Senior and Skyview has identified up to 10 freshmen students that they are responsible for mentoring, who are at high risk to drop.
2. BPS has created a struggling student database that is populated weekly tracking attendance, behavior, grades and failing classes. Principals at each high school receive an attendance spreadsheet each Monday as well as a sheet tracking failing classes and behavior issues each Monday by student. Students individually meet with their mentor administrator to assist with their progress and any other issues they might be facing..
3. For 2016-2017 we are increasing seats at two of our struggling students programs and moving these programs to our Career Center to allow for a more seamless interface between dropout prevention and the Career Center. We will be adding 20 seats to our Transitions Program (struggling student) thus making the availability of movement from Transitions to HiSet Options to the Career Center.
4. Moving Transitions to the Career Center will then allow us to add capacity at our Frameworks program (dropout prevention, behavioral issues).
5. We have an incentive day 4-5 times per year for attendance which has morphed into help with course work in some of our high schools at the end of each quarter to see if we can increase attendance and curb dropouts.

6. Each high school principal meets individually with each student who is thinking of dropping out of school to explore other options available to that student rather than dropping out.

## **BILLINGS PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOLS WILL INCREASE THEIR DAILY ATTENDANCE**

All schools in Billings are concerned about attendance and as part of the Graduation Matters initiative we have set goals to address this issue. We have been keeping school data for several years now. It has been in the last couple of years that there has been an intentional focus on increasing the average daily attendance in our schools and number of days with 10% or less absences. Increasing daily attendance is included in the student achievement section of the Billings Public Schools Strategic Plan. (see attached)

### **Attendance Goals for Billings Public Schools**

Billings Public Schools will increase their attendance rate in each school by 1 % yearly.

The data shared will be from the end of the first semester of the 2014-2015-school term to the end of the first semester of the 2015-2016 school term.

This past year all three of our high schools, in addition to the Career Center, have been rewarding students via an incentive day which is earned by the students if they have no more than three days of absence for any reason in a quarter.

We have been using the media, our reader boards, our newsletters, our web pages and our district website to encourage parents and students to attend school.

- The demographics of Skyview may change in the 2017-2018-school term. Staff will need to be carefully watching 9<sup>th</sup> grade student needs in math during that year as most of these students will be coming from a middle school not in the BPS attendance area.
- Careful attention should be paid at that time to the lower socioeconomic group.

Analysis:

We don't have NWEA data for our high schools since 2012-2013. As we analyze the data, there are areas that need attention. We need to directly focus on our sub groups—special education, low socioeconomic, and Native American.

Since the drop from 2013 to 2015 is so significant attention needs to be paid over the next year to determine if this drop is a reflection of:

- a specific group of students
- common core is not properly aligned
- are teachers properly trained in common core
- is what is being taught throughout the year in geometry not reflected in the assessment
- is our middle school math aligned properly with our high school math

Billings high schools set a target goal of increasing math by 2% a year on the NWEA math assessment through 2018-2019.

### **Billings Senior High School**

Goal:

- Senior High School will increase math proficiency rates in 10<sup>th</sup> grade from 70% in 2013 to 72% in spring of 2014-2015.
- Senior High School will increase math proficiency rates in 10<sup>th</sup> grade from 69% in the spring of 2014-2015 to 71% in the spring of 2015-2016.

Analysis:

- Senior appears to be increasing student competencies in math
- Trends need to be watched using the same instrument
- Data needs to be monitored to assure that scores on assessments increase each year.
- Students need to be targeted for specific skill based instruction.
- Formative assessments need to be developed that align with the assessments and common core.
- Specific intervention times are needed
- Middle school curriculum needs to be reviewed for proper alignment
- A question that we should ask is if not having a math assessment in 9<sup>th</sup> grade allows us to not focus specifically on certain students in 10<sup>th</sup> grade.
- Do we have enough or the right interventions in math?
- Is the fact that the class students are taking is Geometry in 10<sup>th</sup> grade and that is what is being taught all year impacting scores on the NWEA.

### 7. HIGH SCHOOL REDISTRICTING

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Sarah Lord - 5140 Sweet William Ave: Thanked the committee for their work. A Platinum Project student from Senior High recently completed her magnum opus on the importance of diversity in schools. Ms. Lord asked the Board to consider option B1, which creates more equitable diversity.

Sue Vinton - 5115 High Trail Road: Attended most of the redistricting meetings. Wanted to highlight the challenge of transportation when making their decision, and to restate that parents would be responsible for transportation if they choose the grandfathering options.

Kelle Bushard - 833 Krumheuer Drive: Has 2 daughters in Lockwood, her concern is regarding transportation. She and her husband work on the west end, and if her students have to go to Skyview it would cause major challenges for her family. Ms. Bushard asked if Billings Public Schools would consider an activity bus.

Scott McCulloch - 510 North 27th Street: Thankful for Don Reed's positive comments regarding the mill levies. Mr. McCulloch agrees that these levies must be passed. Mr. McCulloch implored the Board to not delay this decision, as it could look like a shenanigan to the public.

Josh Orovecz - 508 Carriage Circle: Servced on the redistricting committee, relocated to Billings in the past year with his son. State he felt the committee was fair, unbiased and worked well together to produce the options presented this evening and felt the volunteers did an exceptional job in a transparent process. He admitted the options aren't perfect, but neither are the geographic challenges of our city. Stated the option presented, B1, was a unanimous decision by the committee.

Karen Sanford Gall - 3110 East MacDonald: Feels socio economic diversity is very important in this process. Asked the Board to remove option A, as it is the least socio economically diverse.

The high school redistricting process has been ongoing since May 2015. Cropper GIS was contracted to facilitate this process. The High School Redistricting Team (made up of 28 community members) had their last meeting on February 9, 2016. The recommendation of the team was presented by Matt Cropper, as well as the alternate choice for consideration of the board.

Dave Cobb, West High Principal, on behalf of all the high school principals, thanked the community and Matt Cropper for their work and input to put together these proposals. He is confident the community will embrace the change that benefits students for years to come. He asked the Board to approve the recommended option. He stated the schools have been doing preliminary work, and if the Board makes the decision tonight it will allow the schools to proceed in class registration, enrollment, and summer programs. If the Board delays their decision it would cause uncertainty for hundreds of students. Mr. Cobb stated the principals support the recommendation that the committee has proposed to the Board.

Trustee Gordon Klasna stated that all the Billings Schools high schools are great facilities, and all the principals and school staff do a great job. Board Chair Greta Besch Moen thanked the committee for their work. Superintendent Terry Bouck expressed his appreciation to Matt Cropper and the redistricting team. Mr. Bouck also thanked the Trustees for the time they put

into the process, as well as parents, staff and community members for their input. He also thanked the high school admin team for their participation. Trustee Kevin Toohill asked Matt Cropper to expand on how the middle schools are split. Mr. Cropper stated walkability played a factor in some of the inequitable splits. Trustee Gordon Klasna asked how the 2015-16 forecasted data compares to that presented in the redistricting materials. Mr. Cropper stated he doesn't expect a huge change, but the district may elect to do another forecast to update the data. Trustee Klasna asked Mr. Cropper if it's typical in these processes to have 57% of impacted students come from one area. Mr. Cropper stated it's a real case by case basis, and the layout of this community played a big part in that. Trustee Mike Leo asked what maximum utilization should be. Mr. Cropper said the optimal utilization would be at 90%, but Billings doesn't have much room to work with, forcing the capacities to near 100%. Trustee Joseph Raffiani asked Mr. Cropper if there was anything about the process that he felt did not go right, or that he would have changed. Mr. Cropper stated he uses this process in all his work, and feels confident it is a good process that involves all parties.

Motion by Trustee Rob Rogers, second by Trustee Susan Layton to approve the High School Redistricting Team's redistricting Draft Recommendation (B1).

Trustee Gordon Klasna once again thanked the committee, he stated he is thankful that through this process more honors and high achievement academics will be an option for all students. He stated he spent a lot of time driving from Lockwood to Senior and Skyview, and doesn't feel it's fair to transport lower income students far distances, and doesn't feel the Board should delay this decision. Trustee Klasna continued, that he felt lowering the drop out rate should have been a factor that was looked at during the process. Mr. Klasna felt transportation was the biggest hardship that came up during the process. Trustee Klasna echoed the public comment that the mill levy is important to pass, regardless of the outcome of this decision, as it is the best thing for students. Trustee Klasna feels that as an elected representative from Lockwood he needs to bring forward the issues that have been brought to him by his community.

Trustee Kevin Toohill wanted to focus on the transportation issue that has been continually brought up by community members. Mr. Toohill stated going forward, the district needs to collaborate and find equitable solutions for transportation across the district. Mr. Toohill feels the committee did the best job they could within the guidelines and challenges that presented themselves. Trustee Toohill stated utilization of the Career Center, mostly due to transportation is another issue that the district needs to find a solution for, it's a great facility and more students should have access to it.

Superintendent Bouck stated he realizes the transportation issues in the district, and the district is currently working with the state to try to find a solution for the entire district.

Trustee Rob Rogers stated this decision is not made easily by the Board, they are keenly aware of the issues effecting families and students from all areas of the district. It's not taken lightly and they want to do what's best for students. Mr. Rogers stated he's frustrated that a problem of transportation is now laid at their feet, one that the City of Billings cannot even find a solution for. Trustee Rogers thanked the public for being here and speaking.

Trustee Joe Raffiani thanked everyone again and accepts their recommendation because of the respect for the work the committee did. Mr. Raffiani thanked the public who have participated in the process throughout. Mr. Raffiani stated that redistricting was a problem that was addressed, however that it created other problems that the Board will also address and he feels the decision made tonight needs to do the most good for the most students, while negatively affecting the

least amount of students.

Trustee Tanya Ludwig thanked the committee, and stated the community needs to accept the change that happens with a growing community.

Trustee Mike Leo stated that once again limited public funds and resources played a part in the problem.

Trustee Janna Hafer thanked the committee, Matt Cropper & the public who have shared their comments.

Trustee Susie Layton state she feels good things are in store for SD2, change is hard but it's also exciting and looks she forward to the future.

##### a. Resolution calling for an Elementary Levy Election, May 3, 2016

WHEREAS, the trustees of any district shall have the authority under the provision of section 20-20-201, MCA, to call for a school election.

WHEREAS, the trustees of this district shall have the authority under the provisions of section 15-10-425 and Title 20 of the Montana Code Annotated to set the amount of a mill levy;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the trustees of School District No. 2, Yellowstone County call for an election of the registered electors of the District to be held on the 3rd day of May, 2016, for the purpose of voting upon the question of whether or not the trustees shall be authorized to make a levy for the purpose of providing funds to support the general fund for the proper maintenance and operation of the elementary district for the 2016-17 school year, beginning July 1, 2016; and,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the trustees of School District No. 2, Yellowstone County declare that the amount of the elementary levy election to be held on May 3, 2016 shall be \$1,287,393 such amount being approximately 6.62 mills. The levy is permanent once approved by the voters, assuming the district levies that amount each year thereafter.

The elector shall return the ballot by mail or deliver it to a place of deposit designated by the Yellowstone County Election Administrator so the ballot is received prior to 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the trustees of High School District No. 2, Yellowstone County declare that the amount of the high school levy election to be held on May 3, 2016 shall be \$855,478 such amount being approximately 3.24 mills. The levy is permanent once approved by the voters, assuming the district levies that amount each year thereafter.

The elector shall return the ballot by mail or deliver it to a place of deposit designated by the Yellowstone County Election Administrator so the ballot is received prior to 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.
