## Montana Public School Enrollment

Montana enrollment peaked in the 1995-1996 school year. Since then, enrollment has decreased by more than 20,000 students. The enrollment decrease is due to the decrease in Montana live births. After declining for seven years, kindergarten enrollment began increasing again in 2003-2004 and has increased by 1,001 students from 2002-2003 to 2008-2009.




For the first time, since the 1993-1994 school year, elementary grades (PK-8) are showing an increase in enrollment (0.2%). High school enrollment is continuing to show a steady decline (-3.2%).

## High School Graduates



## Montana Completion Rates 2002-03 to 2007-08



Overall high school completion rates have been relatively stable over the past six years. The gap between American Indian students and all students combined is 17 percentage points. The gap between white students and American Indian students is approximately 20 percentage points.





## Montana Public School Districts Statewide Revenues 2007 - 2008




## Montana Public School Districts Statewide Expenditures 2007 - 2008





## 2008 Criterion-Referenced (CRT) Results Math




In Spring 2008, Montana students took the CRT test in the 3rd through 8th and 10th grade, measuring progress towards state standards in reading and math.

## Results Reading



The achievement gap between American Indian students and all students is substantial in both reading and math in every tested grade. In math it is never closer that 25 points (4th, 5th, and 6th grade). As a general rule, the older the student, the greater the gap, rising to 31 and 25 points respectively in the 10th grade.
